I am honored to welcome you to *School News Roll Call's* Los Angeles County Superintendents Issue for 2021-22.

It's been a year like no other. Our education communities have risen to the daunting challenges of this COVID-19 pandemic. There hasn't been another period in recent history that so clearly demonstrated the vital and unique role of public education in our society.

We have seen greater appreciation for the essential caretaking role schools play in our communities, as well as increased recognition of teachers and school staff, their skills and their important role in supporting student well-being.

In this special annual edition, you will find valuable information about your school districts and their efforts to ensure students are safe, healthy and engaged in learning during this unprecedented time. You will learn how districts continue to promote educational excellence during distance learning, providing hope and a vision to see students succeed during COVID-19 and beyond.

The Los Angeles County Office of Education is the nation's largest regional education agency. We support and protect the education and well-being of LA County's nearly 2 million children through an equity lens. There are 80 school districts spread across 4,000 square miles of our county. LACOE serves all those districts and their more than 1.4 million students. We do this in many ways.

As mandated by the state legislature, LACOE certifies the financial health of individual districts and approves the related Local Control and Accountability Plans. This translates into LACOE's monitoring of over \$18 billion in education funding for Los Angeles County.

In addition, LACOE plays a key role in reviewing each district's budget to ensure fiscal solvency, and works with them to correct any budgetary problems. We also help districts save and safeguard their money through the cost-effective delivery of essential administrative and business services. One such service equates to LACOE processing 174,000 monthly payroll warrants for school employees.

We educate the county's most vulnerable students, including justice-involved youth and others at high risk of dropping out or with unique needs. We also support the academic needs of LA County's over 26,000 foster youth and 63,000 students experiencing homelessness.

LACOE also operates the nation's top performing Los Angeles County High School for the Arts as well as the popular International Polytechnic High School. We also partner with other county agencies on 15 community schools throughout Los Angeles County that aim to disrupt poverty and address longstanding inequities by focusing on schools as the heart of a community.

In addition, LACOE reaches out to students, families and communities with early childhood programs, parenting and literacy classes, as well as job development services. The centerpiece of our school-readiness efforts is our early learning program. As California's largest Head Start grantee as well as a provider of state programs, LACOE serves about 11,000 children and their families each year.

LACOE plays an important role in turning around low-performing schools and ensuring compliance with federal and state laws, providing districts with technical assistance and intervention/support strategies. We provided guidance, expertise and support to our 80 districts to ensure student learning continues and staff

and students are physically and mentally healthy. Over 100,000 educators attend our trainings annually.

The pandemic has brought much of the work of LACOE to the forefront of the education pandemic response here in LA County. Districts turn to LACOE for state-of-the-art technology services, specialized training and professional development for teachers and school administrators, and other supports and services. We offered tools and

resources to help districts successfully navigate this dynamic public health crisis and prepare for reopening of schools.

We provided child care through our Head Start program, connected families with food services through our Nutrition Services and Community Schools and supported distance learning through professional development.

With our current focus on Equity, the Whole Child and the Power of One LA County, we developed partnerships with the Departments of Public Health, Mental Health and Children and Family Services to get our students and their families the services they need.

Our initiative to help close the digital divide has made possible the distribution of more than 48,000 devices and more than 32,000 hotspots to students in need in 55 districts. Acting on our proposal, the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors allocated \$12.5 million in federal coronavirus relief funds for technology and internet connectivity needed by students to successfully participate in distance learning.

These are just a few examples of our current initiatives to ensure every student receives the support and opportunities they need to achieve their fullest potential during this challenging time.

As you browse the pages of this special edition of *School News Roll Call*, you will learn how our distinguished district superintendents are leading efforts to provide the best possible education for our students in Los Angeles County as we work together to chart a vision for how education can emerge stronger from this crisis.

Finally, the hard work of staff, students, and partners culminated in increased graduation rates across the board for our high schools (88%, including our continuation programs), increased college acceptance and increased a-g completion rates. Reflecting back on March 13, 2020 and what we thought would be a three week closure of our schools, I continue to be stunned by what transpired and the unimaginable outcomes. Los Angeles County had a total of twenty-eight positive cases of COVID-19. It was recommended we close schools until the pandemic could be managed. Months later our classrooms remained closed, our students didn't have a true school experience, and our staff lost out on the joy of seeing students play, engage, laugh, and just be kids. School was redefined.

The impact of the school closures will be felt well into the future. Students suffered the stress of social-emotional issues, learning loss, too much screen time, and school experiences that cannot be replicated at home. In the Hawthorne School District we recognize these issues and are working to meet them head-on. We are providing social-emotional supports for our students through our counselors, deans, and community partners. We know that learning loss is real and must be addressed. We are implementing strategies to provide additional supports to students who had the most difficult time engaging and thriving in a virtual environment. Teachers have been hired with the sole purpose of providing those supports at each school. Tutors have been hired to further meet the needs of students who have experienced learning gaps.

There is no easy fix for students who have lost out on months of a true school experience, but I am confident that working with our caring and exceptional staff, we are on the road to recovery.

Leading Literacy

Storytelling, especially as an oral tradition, is as old as time. Oral storytellers have been looked to as the center of communal life, telling and retelling the history, traditions and knowledge critical to preserving cultures and serving the needs of communities.

Fast forward to the 21st century – storytelling is still alive and well, especially in the information age. Along with blogs and vlogs, video channels and social media platforms, podcasting is a great way to reach a wide audience of listeners and share not just stories, but contextualized information that can enlighten, entertain and certainly, open hearts and minds.

Our podcast [Leading Literacy](#) began as a way to do all of those things. We were interested in presenting conversations with experts in the field that offer sound literacy research, insights, advice and practice.

Oddly, the pandemic has given us access to experts we might not have otherwise had. [Episode 3](#) with NYU professor and literacy researcher and practitioner Dr. Carolyn Strom was particularly noteworthy in offering strategies for closing the gaps between research and practice, especially in our earliest learners.

[Episode 8](#), with esteemed reading guru Dr. Louisa Moats, was nothing short of a thrill. Her 30-plus years of advocating for the science of reading research has shaped the field of reading instruction in indelible ways. Having her share what works with our listeners gave life to the theory, grounded in solid practice.



Leading Literacy has also allowed us to explore a variety of aspects of literacy instruction. Critical media literacy is an area of utmost concern in this Digital Age. In a time of rampant misinformation, propaganda and just a sheer avalanche of information to shift through, students need to have the skills of discernment. Questioning sources and bias analysis are absolutely essential for students to learn, as they seek to preserve our democracy and participate as informed citizens.

[Episode 7](#) features UCLA professor Dr. Jeff Share, an expert in the field of critical media literacy. His personal journey as both a classroom teacher and photojournalist abroad provides a unique lens through which to offer practical ways to teach these skills.

Our other primary goal with the podcast was also just *to listen*. We wanted to hear the voices of our own LA County teachers and students and give a platform for how they have coped in this unprecedented time and what they have learned about themselves and their work.

[Episode 11](#), Teacher Roundtable, pulls back the curtain on what our teachers on the frontline have experienced as they pivoted from the traditional classroom to distance learning. It is a compelling story of resilience and hope – one that we felt was sorely needed. An upcoming episode will feature the voices of students in LA County as they share their experiences as well.

Storytelling is a powerful medium and podcasting has been a wonderful way to expand the literacy stories in LA County as we seek to support and enlighten the educators we serve.
